MESSAGE FROM CHAIR

In the past year, The Aboriginal Sport Circle NWT (ASCNWT) has made significant strides in promoting sport, culture and fostering community engagement across the Northwest Territories. We are proud to report that 28 communities accessed or participated in our programming and funding initiatives, demonstrating our commitment to reaching every corner of our territory.

The highlight of our competitive achievements was our participation in the 2023 North American Indigenous Games held in Kjipuktuk (Halifax), NS. ASCNWT proudly sent 139 athletes to represent Team NT, contributing to our impressive 13th place finish in the medal standings. This success underscores the dedication and talent of our athletes and the support they receive from our communities.

ASCNWT continues to prioritize the development of Indigenous coaches, collaborating closely with Territorial Sport Organizations to achieve this goal. Over the year, we conducted 11 Aboriginal Coaching Modules in 8 communities, with 73 enthusiastic participants gaining valuable skills and knowledge. Additionally, 10 Territorial Sport Organizations accessed funding through our Indigenous Coach Development Program, furthering our commitment to building a strong Indigenous coaching network across the Northwest Territories.

Our commitment to cultural heritage remains strong. We hosted the 12th annual Traditional Games Championships, welcoming over 220 participants from 20 schools. This event not only celebrates our cultural traditions through Northern and Dene Games but also promotes healthy competition and community spirit.

Furthermore, ASCNWT continued its efforts in the development and promotion of Northern Games and Dene Games, preserving and sharing these important cultural activities with a wider audience. This year we held instructor training in Inuvik which saw 15 different instructors certified from 10 communities across the NT.

None of these achievements would have been possible without the dedication and hard work of our staff, Board of Directors, instructors, coaches, and volunteers. Their commitment to our mission is truly commendable and serves as the foundation of our success.

As we reflect on the past year, we look forward to continuing our work in advancing sport, promoting cultural heritage, and fostering community connections throughout the Northwest Territories.


Weekly programming was continued at The Arcan Sport Facility in Yellowknife.

Team NT Archery consisted 8 athletes and 2 coaches from Yellowknife, Hay River, and Behchoko.

ABORIGINAL COACHING MODULES (ACM)

The ACM workshop is a professional development training tool for Indigenous and non-Indigenous coaches who coach Indigenous athletes, as they become certified through the National Coaching Certification Program.

ASCNWT was able to offer the ACM in Norman Wells, Fort Smith, Yellowknife, Fort Providence, Tulita, Paulatuk Fort Simpson, Inuvik.

We are in the midst of training Learning Facilitators. In April 2023, five participants went for training in Vancouver. In addition, we had one participant partake in the Master Learning Facilator training.

ASCNWT is committed to having qualified Learning Facilitators ready to offer the ACM within the Territory, aiming to have a facilitator in each region.

INDIGENOUS COACH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (ICDP)

The ICDP has been designed to help TSO's fund, mentor, identify and develop Indigenous coaches from communities across the NT. The ICDP was developed in 2019 and is available to the public and TSO's as a form of funding for recruiting, supporting, and training Indigenous coaches from communities across the NT. TSO's can apply for our assistance to:

- Fund training or workshops.
- Identify, recruit, and support Indigenous coaches from communities.
- Provide mentorship opportunities for Indigenous coaches.

ABORIGINAL APPRENTICESHIP COACHING PROGRAM (AACP)

The AACP is a partnership between the Aboriginal Sport Circle, ASCNWT, the Canada Games Council, and the Coaching Association of Canada. It provides the opportunity for each province and territory to send two (2) coaches of Indigenous ancestry to the Canada Games as an apprentice coach.

Soccer and Swimming have been selected to have Aboriginal Apprentice Coaches for the 2025 Canada Summer Games.



INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES: ACTIVE FOR LIFE

This full-day workshop with its accompanying resources was created with guidance from Indigenous leaders throughout the country, with the purpose of inspiring community leaders looking for culturally tailored resources that act as a vehicle toward individual and community holistic development.

We are targeting to offer four Indigenous Communities: Active for Life workshops in the following year. One in Ulukhaktok, one in either the South Slave or Dehcho, and two in Yellowknife.

INDIGENOUS COMMUNITY COACH DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM (ICCAP)

The goal of this program is to attract and support underrepresented populations in coaching, such as female and Indigenous coaches. The program provides up to two Indigenous coaches per Games from each Province and Territory the opportunity to develop their coaching skills through the North American Indigenous Games (NAIG) experience.


Bronwyn Rutherford-Simon (soccer) and John Roche (basketball) were coaches at NAIG 2023 through the ICCAP.

The North American Indigenous Games (NAIG) took place from July 15 to 23, 2023 in Kjipuktuk (Halifax, NS) and Millbrook First Nation. These games were originally set to take place the summer of 2020, but had been postponed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The event became the largest multi-sport and cultural event ever be held in Atlantic Canada. More than 5,000 athletes, coaches and team staff from 756 Indigenous nations took part in cultural celebrations, competed in 16 sports





The NWT Archery Championships were held in Fort Providence, NT, from October 20-22, 2023. Moving forward, our goal is to rotate these territorial championships among smaller communities to promote cultural exchange and introduce participants to new 3D archery trails.

ASCNWT improved logistical support with the purchase of a new enclosed cargo trailer for archery gear and acquired additional equipment to accommodate all participants, especially newcomers. Feedback from athletes, officials, parents, and volunteers was positive, reflecting a well-organized event.

The championships attracted 45 archers from communities including Yellowknife, Whati, Behchoko, Hay River, Fort Good Hope, Fort Smith, and Fort Providence. Local volunteers and community members provided essential support. ASCNWT offered a 50% travel reimbursement and two-night accommodations at the Snowshoe Inn Hotel to encourage participation, though some archers still faced financial barriers.

Future plans include hosting the championships in Hay River and aiming to increase involvement from the Sahtu and Beaufort Delta regions by expanding local archery programs.

This year was a notable success, with 20 schools participating from across the territory. Records were broken, and a new game was introduced, highlighting exceptional talent and community engagement. Gerry Kisoun served as emcee, bringing his extensive knowledge of Indigenous Games to the event. Special thanks to Hovak Johnston and the Yellowknives Dene Drummers for their role in the opening ceremonies. The event was supported by 20 officials from across the NWT, including one apprentice coach from Fort Good Hope.



Key achievements included Malkin Kudlak of Mangilaluk School setting new records in the male one-foot high kick (7'3") and male two-foot high kick (5'6"). Lucy MacKay from Ecole William MacDonald tied the Female One-Foot High Kick record at 6'3".

The 2024 TGC also marked the inclusion of the Triple Jump as a new event, with Malia Williams of Weledeh and Malkin Kudlak setting inaugural records of 20'7" and 23'2" respectively.


ASCNWT AWARDS DINNER

Adam's hands-on apprenticeship under his father hones his skill in crafting ulus, knives, and carvings. His creations—over 1800 ulus and 500 knives—traverse the globe, repurposed from animal parts or recycled materials.
